Our local neighborhood columnist, Chris Coats, recently sent me an email asking me about my holiday traditions and my wishes for the coming year. I don't know if my answers will make her column, but I thought I would share my wishes with you here in our own newsletter.



I wish that this would be the year that people actually return to being nice to each other, and showing respect for ALL of God's children and all of God's creation. I wish we would all learn to listen, instead of always needing to be right. I wish our focus would turn to taking care of each other, instead of all of the self-centered focus on individual "rights." And most of all, I wish that faith would be stronger than fear. So, I am clearly an idealist, but one can always hope for miracles, right?

My answer came after reflecting on the tone of so many voices in our society lately. Whether you listen to the politicians vying for popularity among potential voters, or the many anonymous voices on social media, you have no doubt heard the same things I have. We seem to live in a culture of fear, ignorance, and hate. It keeps getting harder and harder to hear the voices calling for compassion and compromise. I really do hope and pray that things change for the better in the coming year.

Can we change the overall tone of society? Maybe. Maybe not. But we can change the way we respond in our own community, and that may have ripple effects elsewhere. It's not easy sometimes. Negativity is contagious, and it is honestly hard sometimes to just be kind in the face of all that evil.

I also had a discussion recently with someone who asked for advice on how I manage to be nice to people when sometimes I may not really like them. While that may not always be easy to do either, I do think that's where we have to begin. What I always remind myself is that I may not like someone very much, but I still love them as one of God's children. I may not agree with another, but I still try to show respect for the person. Somehow, I have to separate the words and actions from the PERSON. Even the most hateful words usually come from a place of fear and ignorance, and not necessarily because the person is a bad person. That's the most difficult distinction to make in this whole process. There are times I have to bite my tongue so hard that it hurts, but in my role as pastor, that's a pretty important thing to remember.

Ultimately, I honestly try to find the positives about other people and focus on those positives instead of just seeing the things I dislike or with which I disagree. Do I always succeed? I'm sure I don't. But I try. I really, really try. That's all we can do if we try to live as Jesus teaches us. We are to love our neighbors as ourselves, and that includes even those we name as enemies. Love and like are two different things, but love has to be the strongest of the two.

Booksome Ladies

Booksome

On Wednesday, January 20th, the Booksome Ladies will meet in the Conrad Library at 9:30 a.m. Our book for discussion is Putting Away Childish Things by Marcus J. Borg who is a teacher, writer, Bible scholar and theologian. In his first novel, Borg uses his core teachings on faith and the Bible to show their power in changing the lives of people. This book is the moving and

personal story of Kate Riley, a Professor of Religious Studies at Wells College in a small town in central Wisconsin and her interaction with faculty and students. Kate, who is Episcopalian, is also an author of non-fiction works on religious subjects and is quite well-known. She receives an invitation from Scudder Theological Seminary to come for an interview and a possible offer of a year-long position there. Her probable tenure at Wells becomes a large factor. As a Professor, Kate is very involved with her students and is influential in their faith lives. In Putting Away Childish Things, Borg recounts Professor Riley's vocational and spiritual journey in a thought-provoking way. It is an exploration of the kind of religious and social issues that Christians face today.


